\*Hispanic and Latino are often used interchangeably though we recognize they actually mean two different things. Hispanic refers to people who speak Spanish or are descended from Spanish-speaking populations, while Latino refers to people who are from or descended from people from Latin America. Latinx is used as an alternative to the gender binary inherent to formulations such as Latina/ Latino. For this activity, we choose to use "hispanic", except when the linked resource uses something else, then we use their copy.
